





Canada's major banks forecast that the Province will continue to drive Canada's economic growth in 2019.

Thunder Bay/FW First Nation's location provides immediate access to the US Mid-West and markets such as Minneapolis and Chicago.

It also acts as a service hub for major resource developments and construction projects in Western Canada.








# **Availability of Industrial Land**

Thunder Bay's Official Plan recommends attracting investment to vacant and underutilized industrial areas.

The Waterfront Industrial Zone includes 2,500 acres of vacant/underutilized land zoned for heavy industrial use, permitting such activities as:









Companies locating in Thunder Bay/FWFN can access a well-educated labour force. 61.4% of adults in Thunder Bay/FWFN possess a post-secondary education – a rate higher than any OECD country.

Thunder Bay/FWFN has a strong bilingual workforce, absenteeism and turnover are low and labour/management relations are excellent.

Northwestern Ontario's (NWO) labour force of 110,200 is experiencing an unemployment rate of 5.1% while the unemployment rate in Thunder Bay/FWFN is about 6.8% while the Provincial average is at 6.5%.



With a pool of about 6,000 tradespeople the construction industry is geared to meet fluctuating demands both from within and outside the Thunder Bay/FWFN.

FWFN have considerable experience in the construction of major ICI projects such as hospitals, schools, courthouses, water treatment facilities, pulp & paper mills, mines and mineral processing facilities.

A number of companies can provide technical and consulting engineering services to projects at all stages of development.at all stages of development. A diverse range of firms involved in fabrication, refractory, piping, machining and the provision of goods and services support the heavy industrial development sector.

## **Cost of Labour**

The cost of labour in TB/FWFN is up to 13.4% lower than other selected jurisdictions in Canada and the U.S.



Companies in Thunder Bay region benefit from Ontario's highly competitive corporate tax rates.


Competitive Corporate Tax Rates (%)






# **Cost-Competitive Business Environment**

Comparison of Health Care Cost for a Typical Company








# Incentive Programs Designed to Encourage and Support Industrial Development

#### FedNor (Federal)

Helps to fund community projects as well as private sector initiatives designed to improve the economic and social well-being of the North as a whole. Also provides internship programs.

# Northern Ontario Heritage Fund Corporation (Provincial)

Provides up to 50% to a guideline maximum of \$1 million on capital expenditures, leasehold improvements, staff training, marketing, equipment purchases and land servicing with up to one half of the funding in the form of a conditional grant with the remainder in the form of a repayable loan.

Also provides internship programs and incentive programs for R&D, Apprenticeship Tax Credit, and wage subsidies.

#### **Next Generation of Jobs Fund (Provincial)**

A five-year, \$1.15 billion strategy that can help innovative companies take the lead in worldwide markets which offer long-term growth potential. Grants up to 15% of eligible project costs are available to support companies making new investments that help establish Ontario as a global leader in emerging markets.

# Advanced Manufacturing Investment Strategy (Provincial)

This \$500 million program provides repayable loans, interest free for up to five years, to encourage companies to invest in leading-edge technologies and processes.

CEDC also has access to other province wide programs such as SADI and IRAP as well as all programs made available through the Ministry of Economic Development, Job Creation and Trade




## **Leadership in Innovation**

**Superior Science** (www.superiorscience.ca) is securing the future by encouraging young people to participate in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM).




# **Diverse and Multicultural Community**
