Community Challenges

Drugs = Gangs, Guns & Organized Crime

- 52 persons arrested in the past year
- 47 persons charged
- All 52 were from Southern Ontario and Western Canada
- 9 firearms seized including 8 semiautomatic handguns – all fully functional
- Over \$1,000,000 in cash
- Nearly \$1,000,000 in drugs
