


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#### A MESSAGE FROM THE ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES DEPARTMENT



Happy new year! A new year brings a new list of priorities and projects to complete, along with a new budget. Some minor projects include replacing resident room door handles as some are original and are due to be changed out. We've received our first batch and will start changing out this month.

We will continue to upgrade lighting in resident rooms by changing the recessed light fixtures with flush mount LED fixtures to better illuminate the entrances. As we move closer to spring, we will be enhancing the airflow on Home Areas 2 through 4, as we did on Home Area 1 this past autumn. This will allow us to better balance the air and allow for more consistent temperatures throughout the Home Areas.

Now that the snow has arrived, our team will be working diligently to keep walkways clear so please do your best to refrain from walking where vehicle traffic travels as those

We currently have 44 Practical Nursing students and six Clinical Instructors from Confederation College working in our home. The students are in their first year of training and will be with us until February 25th. The student feedback has been very positive, they are learning a great deal from our competent staff and feel very welcomed.

I am excited to announce that we will also be welcoming our first group of clinical students to complete their Preceptorship Training in April 2024. This different group of Confederation College students are about to complete their final clinical training and have chosen Pioneer



Ridge to provide this mentorship/preceptorship. Our knowledgeable Preceptors will be mentoring these "soon-to-be" practical nurses and PSWs during April and most of May. The hope is that these students will then be hired here at Pioneer Ridge to ensure a smooth transition to their clinical career and a sustainable workforce for our home.

I will also be attending several job fairs within the next few months to remind potential nursing students that Pioneer Ridge is a great place to learn and work.

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#### A MESSAGE FROM THE BEHAVIOURAL SUPPORT TEAM

January 8<sup>th</sup>, Behavioural Support Lead, Resident Wellness Worker and Administrator presented to City Council, requesting approval for single source contract to transition from a medical model of care to an emotion-based model of care. Emotion based care is person centered care in a more home-like environment with focus on feelings and meaningful moments. Administration recommended that the City of Thunder Bay adopt "Meaningful Care Matters (MCM) – "Butterfly Approach" because:

- is informed by a 20-year history and evidence resulting in improved clinical outcomes with demonstrated financial savings
- ensures successful culture change through extensive training, development, facilitation, continuous consultancy and accreditation
- · Best reflects our vision and mission

We are proud to announce that City Council unanimously voted in favour for single source contract! What does that mean? "Meaningful Care Matters" ~ "Butterfly Approach" will be the most suited, emotion-based model of care for Pioneer Ridge Home Area 1, "a place to live well". More updates to follow soon!

Our Residents on Home Area 1, are enjoying their new, personalized "Door Wraps." Next phase will be completion of the remaining door wraps on the exit door, fire wall doors, spa room doors and bathroom. Painting will follow soon after!







"Hush No Rush"



When: Wednesday Feb. 7th – Wednesday March 13th

Time: 7:00 a.m-7:00 p.m

Home Area 2 will trial a six week "Hush No Rush" Wednesday to determine if limiting environmental overstimulation will result in a decrease of personal expressions for our residents. During "Hush No Rush" staff, families, volunteers and other visitors will be reminded to be aware of rushing and to limit any controllable distractions - silencing cell phones, lowering tone of voice, moving the floor scrubbing days to another date, etc. Staff will also be implementing quieter programs on those days, limiting deliveries, and closing doors to home

The Responsive Behaviour Committee thanks you for your donations of nursery items for Home Area 1. We are still requiring a small Baby change table and shelving...Nursery will be set up upon completion of painting the Home Area.









This fall season has been a busy one, with four total Respiratory outbreaks and one suspected outbreak since August 2023. COVID-19 and RSV being the two major causes of all five instances, and a mix of RSV and COVID for one of the five outbreaks total. All staff and visitor have shown their commitment to Hand Hygiene and Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) as the average outbreak length was only 13 days since August 2023, Impressive.

Vaccination Campaigns have been quite successful. Starting in October we administered our first doses of Influenza vaccine with a strong uptake of 94% of all residents receiving the vaccine. In November we administered the

COVID-19 XBB vaccination with 84% vaccination rate. In December the government of Ontario provided financial coverage for all residents living within a Long-Term Care facility to receive the RSV vaccine. To date the RSV vaccination rate is at 76% of all residents with the next round of vaccines coming in February for all new admissions- stay tuned.

Daily auditing of staff, residents, and visitors continue as the cold and flu season continues to press on into 2024. Please continue to be diligent in practicing hand hygiene and donning of PPE. If visiting a loved one with a known Antibiotic Resistant Organism (ARO), please don the appropriate PPE as indicated on the signage posted outside the room, any questions regarding ARO's and your loved one feel free to ask staff or reach out to IPAC ©

#### A MESSAGE FROM THE NURSING ADMINISTRATION TEAM

Our Nursing Department has been working to recruit qualified nursing staff to enhance the quality of care provided at Pioneer Ridge. We conducted more than 100 interviews last year and have successfully welcomed 8 Home Support Staff, 40 Personal Support Workers, 9 Registered Practical Nurses, and 7 Registered Nurses to our nursing team. Additionally, we are excited to inform you about a new initiative starting this March - the implementation of a flex PSW shift on each home area. We are hoping that this will ensure a continuous delivery of quality care to our residents. We are also pleased to inform you that Pioneer Ridge has recently secured funding to acquire new diagnostic equipment including ECG machines, ultrasound machines, urine analyzer machine, bladder scanner, and vital sign monitoring
